This past month was archiving in a microcosm: accessions, reference queries, outreach, partnerships, continuing education, and processing. With a little crushing disappointment thrown in for good measure. The disappointment was, of course, the news that opening of the Library and Heritage Center in Parksley had been delayed once again.

Donations of collections is on the rise, and we accepted several important ones this past month. Mr. John W. Edmonds, IV donated some materials related to members of his family, Benjamin and Bessie Gunter, as well as materials related to the former family business *The Peninsula Enterprise*. A week later, we welcomed Sarah and Robert Lentz to the library for the donation of the story about the making of Mr. Lentz's book: *The Story Behind the Tree: Chesapeake Wood Art History, Eastern Shore of Virginia and Beyond*. This donation presents a particular challenge as it contains text, audio, and video within the same package, as well as the metadata supporting it, so we'll need to strategize about best methods for preserving and sharing the entirety of *The Story of the Tree*.


With the assistance of Judith Grier, we were able to serve Frs. Michael McAndrew and Michael Imperial in their quest for information about migrants of the Southeast and immigrant ministry. Fr. McAndrew has been serving the migrant community for decades, and Fr. Imperial is the Pastor at St. Peter the Apostle here in Onley. Fr. Imperial and Christopher Pote are in further conversation of potential areas of collaboration and oral history subjects.

The Heritage Center has agreed to partner with two local initiatives with potential wide-ranging benefits. Jazmine Collins has been representing the HC in participating in the Northampton250 committee. We have agreed to make relevant resources to the 250th U.S. anniversary to the committee, as well as assist with specific research and offered to host events. Collins and Pote also met with members of the ESVA Climate Equity Project. The HC availed its historical material for research and offered use of the lecture hall and meeting rooms (once available), as well as to be the repository for the Project and the oral histories they conduct, so that the information gleaned and gathered will forever have a home on the Shore.

Pote also attended remotely the Spring conference of the Mid-Atlantic Regional Archives Conference. It is important to stay current, learn about new initiatives and other repositories, but also energizing to meet with other archivists and information professionals and share successes and failures.

It was a busy month. Much appreciation, as always, to Judith Grier and Jazmine Collins.

Passive Programming:

Summer Planning:

We have continued to purchase supplies for Summer Reading. There are a number of Social Media posts and templates for summer that will be used during the month of May. Coming Soon: New Nature Backpacks

In late 2022, the Eastern Shore Chapter of the Virginia Master Naturalist Program donated a collection of books and literature to ESPL. The donated materials cover a variety of subjects, but all share a focus of the wildlife and natural environment found on Virginia's Eastern Shore. Some of the donated items will be cataloged for the general library collection at Accomac, but the remainder will be utilized to create new Nature Backpacks to supplement backpack kits already available at the library.

Currently, the library offers a Birding Backpack, with binoculars and field guides, and fifteen "I Love Virginia State Parks" Nature Backpacks. The State Park backpacks include a parking pass for free entry to any Virginia State Park. These backpacks are particularly popular with local families, as they contain pocket guides, dip nets, bug observation containers, and magnifying lenses.

Utilizing the items donated by the Master Naturalists, ESPL's Technical Services department is preparing five new backpack kits. The planned themes of the kits are Beaches & Fishing, Butterflies, Forests & Flowers, Virginia Wildlife, and Nature in Winter. In addition to the donated books and pamphlet literature, ESPL has purchased lightweight, water resistant daypacks to house each themed collection, and will be adding laminated pocket field guides, perfect for outdoor adventuring.

Once the new backpacks have been prepared and cataloged, they will be available for check out. The backpacks will be located at the Main Library (currently in Accomac), but can also be requested for borrowing by library patrons at any of the three other ESPL libraries in Nassawadox, Cape Charles, or Chincoteague Island for.

ESPL is grateful to the Master Naturalists for their generous gift that will not only expand the library's general collection, but also serve as the foundation for the new backpack kits. Library staff are excited to add these additional backpacks to the library's collection and hope that they provide inspiration and knowledge that library patrons can use to venture outside and explore the natural world.









April was a wonderfully busy month at CCML!



Story Time & Crafts resumed this month, meeting every Tuesday morning at 10:30 am. Participants have enjoyed listening to stories, singing songs and playing instruments, and being creative with their crafts. Children receive a free library tote bag (supplies limited) upon their first visit. Program is designed for ages birth to four.



Grab & Go bags, a passive program started during COVID, continue to be popular with local patrons and visitors. Every month, staff select a theme and assemble 25 – 50 bags filled with educational activities, honeycomb crayons, and a special giveaway (which varies each month). This month, with grant monies from Virginia Department of Environmental Quality, CCML purchased childrens books about recycling and the environment. One free

book was included in our Earth Day Grab & Go bags, along with earth friendly activities.



CCML was awarded two additional grants in April. We received a Billie Fitzgerald Memorial Conservation Grant for Environmental Education through Eastern Shore Soil & Water Conservation District, which will help fund our seed cart and a Virginia Commission for the Arts Touring Grant to assist with summer programs.

At the end of April, we joined with other community groups in Cape Charles and hosted our Seed Cart Kickoff. CCML partnered with the Virginia Coastal Zone Management Program and Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation to bring a Plant Eastern Shore Natives Campaign display. In the weeks leading up to the event, staff and volunteers packed and labeled over 300 seed packets! Flower seeds are all native to the Eastern Shore of Virginia and vegetable seeds are non-GMO. Donations for seeds

came from individuals, the Friends of the Library and from the folks at New Roots Youth Garden. The seed cart is located in the library and *free seeds are available to everyone*, four seed packets per month.

Our collection of children's books was surveyed to identify items that were not circulating or were in poor condition, and these have been retired to make room for new and exciting reads. Recent acquisitions include a juvenile biography of Supreme Court Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson as well as books about otters, seeds, and baseball.

Weekly children's story hours continued on Wednesdays from 4:00 to 5:00 PM, and are planned to continue on through the month of May. Thanks Megan!
