On September 9th, 2025 The Heritage Center hosted a lecture by Laura Smith of Sunday Historical. Smith presented about Cape Charles first black woman business owner, Laura Lewis, who operated a bar and saloon in the early 1900s. Smith's documentary evidence included newspapers articles, land and tax records, and census documents along with historical context that crafted a story of a pioneering woman with a keen business sense that moved from the rough waterfront of Norfolk to the growing "Cape Charles City," where she prospered.



The Heritage Center celebrated 25 years of hosting the MilesFiles on our website with a reception on Septem-

ber 30th, 2025. At the reception, the Heritage Center previewed the new MilesFiles logo (shown below) which was designed as a gift for Moody K. "M.K" Miles, the creator and editor of MilesFiles. After light hors d'oeuvres and opening remarks by System Director Pote, Dr. Brooks Miles Barnes gave a heartwarming background of M.K. Miles' engineering career and foray into genealogical research and the beginnings of the MilesFiles. David Scott informed attendees of some of the aspects of the MilesFiles and how easily documents like survey maps can be added and used to glean genealogical and family information. Kellee Blake spoke of nationally recognized scholars, including herself that have used MilesFiles as a vital tool in their research and the many possible applications of MilesFiles in future research. She also presented M.K. Miles with a Lifetime Achievement Award from Virginia Humanities in recognition of all of the years of relentless work that M.K. Miles has put into the development of the database as well as the compilation and publication of several source materials and records. The event culminated in the official signing of the Deed of Gift of the MilesFiles to the library to make it accessible in perpetuity.

Next month, the Heritage Center will host Andy Nunez on October 14th to share a few haunted tales from Accomack and Northampton, such as those found in his *Ghosts of the Eastern Shore* books.

#### A Library Software Update and Popular Authors

ESPL utilizes the Atriuum Integrated Library System software for both the library catalog and the staff circulation management modules. Recently, Atriuum released an update that included many long-awaited improvements. The new functionalities will allow library staff to better serve our patrons and more easily navigate through workflow processes.

The reports module in Atriuum has always been flexible and robust, but the recent update has increased our ability to analyze circulation and collection data. The update included a new report that calculates circulation activity by author. Not only can this information help to guide collection development decisions, it also happens to be rather interesting.

Many of the authors with the highest circulation are not surprising, given their record of bestselling titles year after year. There are a few newcomers to the list, however, that have emerged relatively recently and quickly gained a strong readership.

For the past year, here are the top fifteen authors in order of circulation counts:

As with all data, there are some qualifiers that should be noted. While James Patterson leads the author list, he is very prolific (twelve titles so far in 2025 alone), which would give him an advantage in accumulating circulation counts.

Nora Roberts, in the number two spot, also writes as J. D. Robb (number 10), so her combined total is actually 599. Also, it's nice to see Agatha Christie holding her own against more modern writers.

For our younger readers, here are the top five children's authors:

### Programs & Outreach Report

#### Tiffany Flores, Programs and Outreach Librarian



As part of the Regional Library's goal to support the community, we hosted another tour through the Adult Lifelong Learners Academy. Tiffany and Charle led the class where engaged learners got to tour the library and learn about all the resources we offer. All of them were pleased with the library and the number of resources they could access. Tiffany also collaborated with the Nature Conservancy for a nature hike featuring journaling. The attendees enjoyed learning about the marsh and all of its inhabitants. Movie Night continues to be of great success! This

month twelve people attended and watched *A Minecraft Movie*. This month's adult craft of decoupage trinket boxes brought in four attendees, and was highly complimented. Additionally, the Memory Café continues to see active use with about fifteen attendees per month.

Autumn brings opportunities for outreach as the schools call for vendors for their events to support the community and its learners. For the second year in a row the Regional Library was invited out to the STEAM Community Day hosted by the Mary N. Smith Alumni Association on September 6th. This event focuses on inspiring youth to explore STEAM by exposing them to various organizations and schools who focus on STEM education. Tiffany and Willow

attended and brought STEAM toys to encourage children to learn and play. This was immensely successful with the children because they were able to get on the floor and explore STEAM through interaction. The Regional Library was also invited to Accawmacke Elementary School's Otterfest on September 20th. This event is always good for reminding parents that the library is here to support them and their students. About 150 parents and students attended and went around to the various tables at the event. Finally, on September 23rd, Tiffany attended the annual Nurse Family Partnership Graduation for the two-year-olds who are graduating



out of the program. This is always a nice opportunity to encourage parents to get a library card and visit the library. About ninety people attended this event.

While Summer may be over, there is never a dull moment for Tiffany in the programming de-



partment. The Makerspace is preparing to open and as part of this, Tiffany is scheduling training classes for the equipment in the room. Additionally, she is working on preparing a tank for a future library pet which will be used for educational programming. Tiffany has also been assisting Charle with the STEM Kits by finishing up the printables for some of the kits. Additionally, she has ordered additional STEM toys to add to both the Kids' Program Room and the STEM Kits.



Northampton Free Library welcomed Autumn and the start of the new school year with a range of public programs for all ages in September. Tech Help continued to be offered all day on demand on every Wednesday. The Library hosted our children's story time and snack on Thursday, September 4th. The next week on September 11th, the library hosted an adult memory box craft. Staff and attendees decorated their own memory boxes by applying cutouts from old books and magazines with decoupage. The library's monthly craft activity for kids took place on Thursday the 18th. This was a quick and easy colorful macaroni necklace craft, with snacks and juice boxes provided.



Northampton Free Library will usher in the spooky season with a children's story time and snack on Thursday, October 2nd starting at 4:30 PM. The following week, adult patrons are invited to sign up for a cozy tea blending and bookmark decoration craft starting at 6:00 PM on Thursday, October 9th. This time we'll have a whole new set of herbs and flavors to pick from. Keep an eye on our Facebook page for a signup link or just ask at the front desk. October's last scheduled program will take place on Thursday, October 16th starting at 6:00 PM. Stop by to hear a dragon story and then make your own paper roll dragons that breathe fire! This program is free and no sign up is required. Northampton Free Library will also be open to trick-or-treaters until closing time at 5:00 PM on Halloween Friday. We'll have a bowl of candy out all day long! As always, Northampton Free Library will also continue to offer tech help on demand on every Wednesday through the month of October. Patrons are welcome to ask a member of staff for assistance at the front desk—no appointments are required.

In other news, Northampton Free Library's security and fire detection systems have been updated.


