Milliner Intern Ethan Ross finished his work with the Heritage Center at the end of November. He started the semester by learning the delicate work of processing archival collections. This generated three linear feet of properly stored letters, documents, and photographs from the Zillah Mapp Winn Collection, a sub-collection of the larger Mapp-LeCato Collection. Once most of the collection was processed, Ethan turned his focus to cataloging and learning the Heritage Center's archival management software, Proficio. Ethan cataloged what he processed and worked alongside Archivist Luke Kelly to identify fields in the software that will be required for future catalog



entries. Ethan was prepared with questions about the software and joined staff in watching training videos to learn Proficio. One of the results of his internship is a new living document detailing what he has learned while using the software. This is a great resource for future interns and volunteers that will expediate the process of learning Proficio and can be built upon as we incorporate more aspects of the software. It will also be a great guide as we standardize the cataloging process. The Heritage Center is appreciative of Ethan's work and we wish him well as he continues his studies.



The Heritage Center also received an interesting tapestry from the now closed Melfa United Methodist Church that was created between 1936-1937. The tapestry features the names of church members embroidered in a flower design.

The Heritage Center hosted the Virginia Folklife Program's "Food, Community, and Climate on Virginia's Eastern Shore" exhibit reception and listening party on November 15th. In 2023, researchers from the project began interviewing people working in agriculture, seafood, restaurants, and markets about their culinary traditions, cultural continuity and changes, and how they adapt to the Eastern Shore's changing landscape. The Heritage Center has also created a cookbook display to accompany the food culture exhibit as well as to highlight some Eastern Shore holiday recipes this season. The exhibit, which includes an interactive timeline, will run until April 2026.

Adopt-a-Book and Help the Library's Collection Grow!



As the end of the year approaches, our thoughts begin to turn toward giving. Gifts may be shared with those near and dear to our hearts, but also with our local community. To help celebrate the gift of reading, the Eastern Shore Public Library (ESPL) offers the **Adopt-a-Book Program**, which is a perfect way to share one's love of books with their Shore neighbors.

Participants in the Adopt-A-Book program select an upcoming bestseller, or a specific author, title, or subject area, and ESPL then purchases that item. The adopter's tax-deductible donation can be acknowledged with a bookplate inscription that can include the donor's name, or the name of the person for whom the book was purchased to honor or memorialize. Additionally, a letter of acknowledgement can be sent to the recipient of their choice.

An added perk of adoption is that the donor, or the individual honored through the adoption, can be the first to read their adopted book – even if there is a waiting list for it! Adopters can jump to the top of the list for their favorite author's newest release and know that their donation will benefit all who enjoy the book in the future.

Books can be adopted at all four ESPL library locations in Parksley, Chincoteague, Nassawadox, and Cape Charles. Books, DVDs, and audiobooks are available for \$25. Children's and Young Adult books are available for \$20. Multiple month or year-long adoption subscriptions are also available for those who would like to extend their giving over time.

The Adopt-a-Book program is available during the holidays and also year-round, and is an excellent way to celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, and other special occasions. Some readers choose to celebrate the everyday instead and adopt a book just because they love to read. No matter the reason, consider helping the library's collection grow, and making a difference by supporting Shore literacy!

Programs & Outreach Report

November was a busy month for making huge progress on projects that have been in the works for a while, the biggest among them being the Makerspace. This month Tiffany worked with Jamie to finalize the procedures and systems in place that'll help staff keep everything functional. In addition to finalizing procedure, Jazmine provided training for the Brother ScanNCut to patrons who were both engaged and fascinated by the technology. Training for staff has also begun. Each front desk staff members filled out a form to indicate which equipment they would like to learn and will be or have received training for it. Overall, November programming has gone well! Saturday Story Times have ramped up a

bit, with eighteen participants between four sessions. Teen Nights have become really popular. We have noticed that more female teens attend and do crafts/activities than male teens attend and play games. Dinosaurs have entered the library! In celebration of Dinovember, the library has purchased small, medium, and large foam dinosaur bones to be used in the library and at outreach. Currently, the large bones have been set out in the kids' space for independent play. This has resulted in kids playing and building dinosaurs, going on 'adventures,' and being archaeologists!





During October both the Hare Valley Headstart located in Exmore and the Hallwood Head start reached out to the library to coordinate bringing their students to the library. This culminated in four field trips scheduled throughout November. Almost every week, Tiffany led groups of students through the library for a tour then ended with Story Time in the kid's space. In total eighty-six students and teachers attended the library. Many of the teachers indicated they would be contacting the library for more tours. In addition to the field trips, Tiffany has made plans with the Hallwood Headstart to attend their parent meeting in January to educate parents on library resources and tools available through the library card.

Finally, the tank has piqued curiosity in the children who visit the library with many wonderful guesses about what our new friend can be! Guesses have included: snakes, fish, turtles, rabbits, sharks (oh my), and DINOSAURS. While there is still more that has to be done to the tank to ensure the success of the project, the library is almost ready to bring in the creature. This month, Tiffany learned a vital lesson about bioactive tanks: they can and will CRASH. Due to a mix of temperature issues and contaminated substrate, Tiffany's snail bioactive located in her office began to exhibit signs of a crash. Signs include bad odors, uneven moisture control, pests and mold in the tank, and creatures dying. Fortunately, Tiffany caught and rebalanced the tank before it got dire but the process required a full tank restore. The result is much happier snails (yes, you can tell) and a very crucial lesson. Preventative measures have been set in place to ensure that the new tank will not crash as easily.




and distinctive fragrance and are believed to guide spirits back to their families, creating a bridge between life and death.
